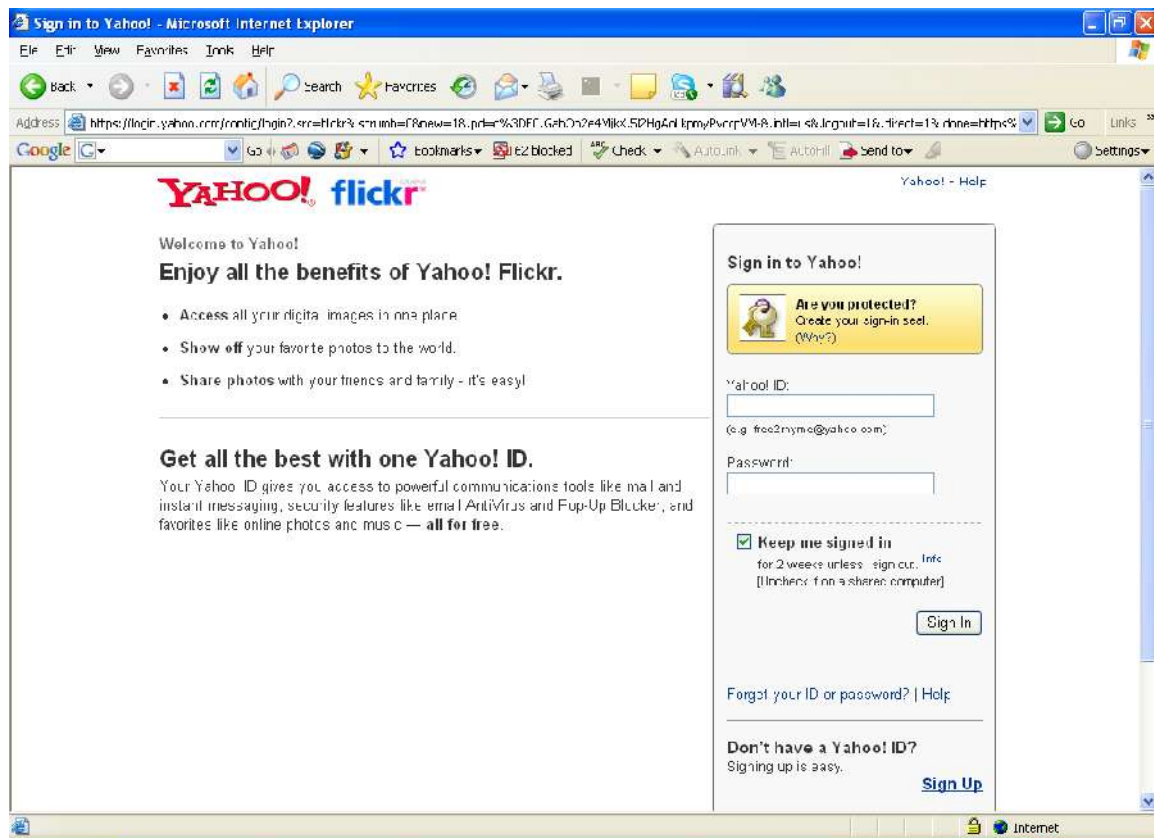


Create a Flickr Account

Open the following Web-page;

<http://www.flickr.com/>

On the right-and side of this front page you will see a button which reads, 'create your account'. This takes you to another page which is managed by Yahoo and you will now need to create an account by clicking on the 'Sign Up' button on the bottom right-hand side of the page;



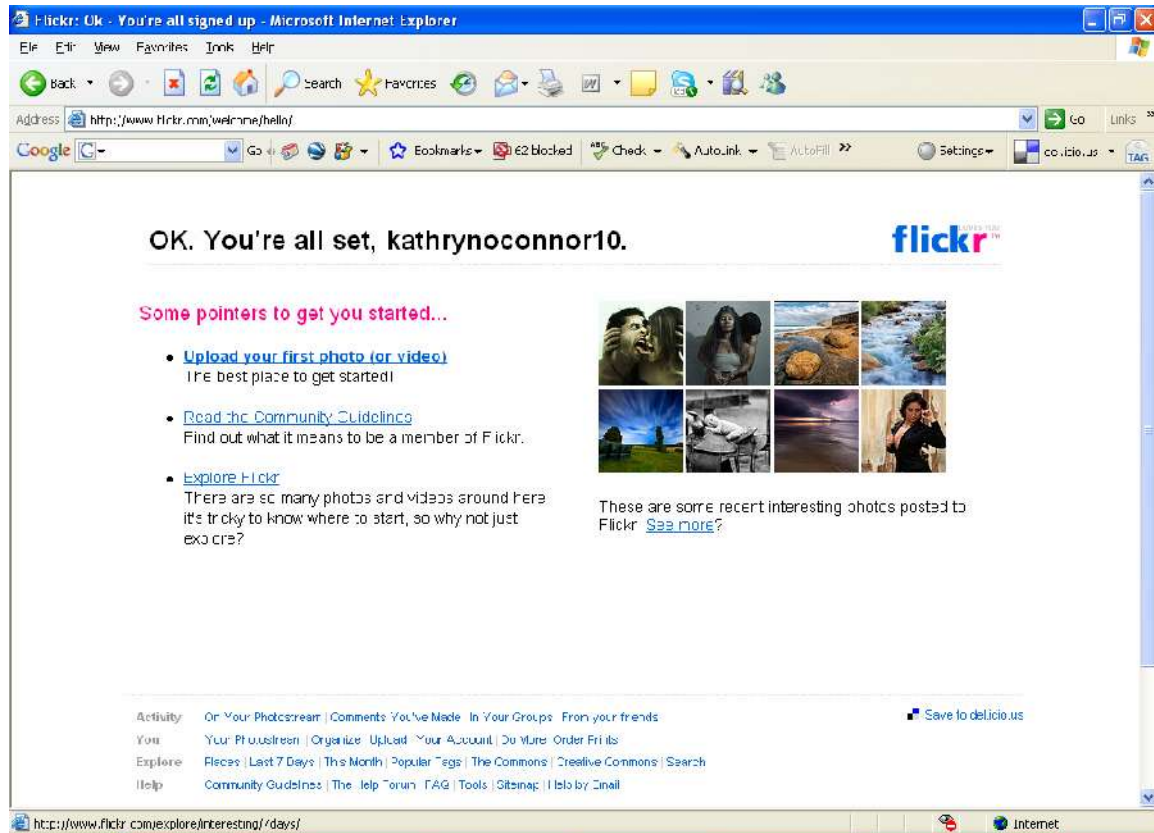
From this page you will be directed to a secure account set-up page and you will be prompted to select a yahoo username.

TIP: This username has to be unique and therefore it is often unusual to be granted access to your name as these are often taken by other users. However it is possible to add numbers after your name to secure a familiar username such as billy102@yahoo.com

Once you have a username and password verified you are ready to start uploading and sharing photos on-line.

Upload and Share Pictures on flickr

Once you log into the flickr account for the first time you will be greeted with the option to 'get started'. From here you can upload your photos directly from your PC into flickr.



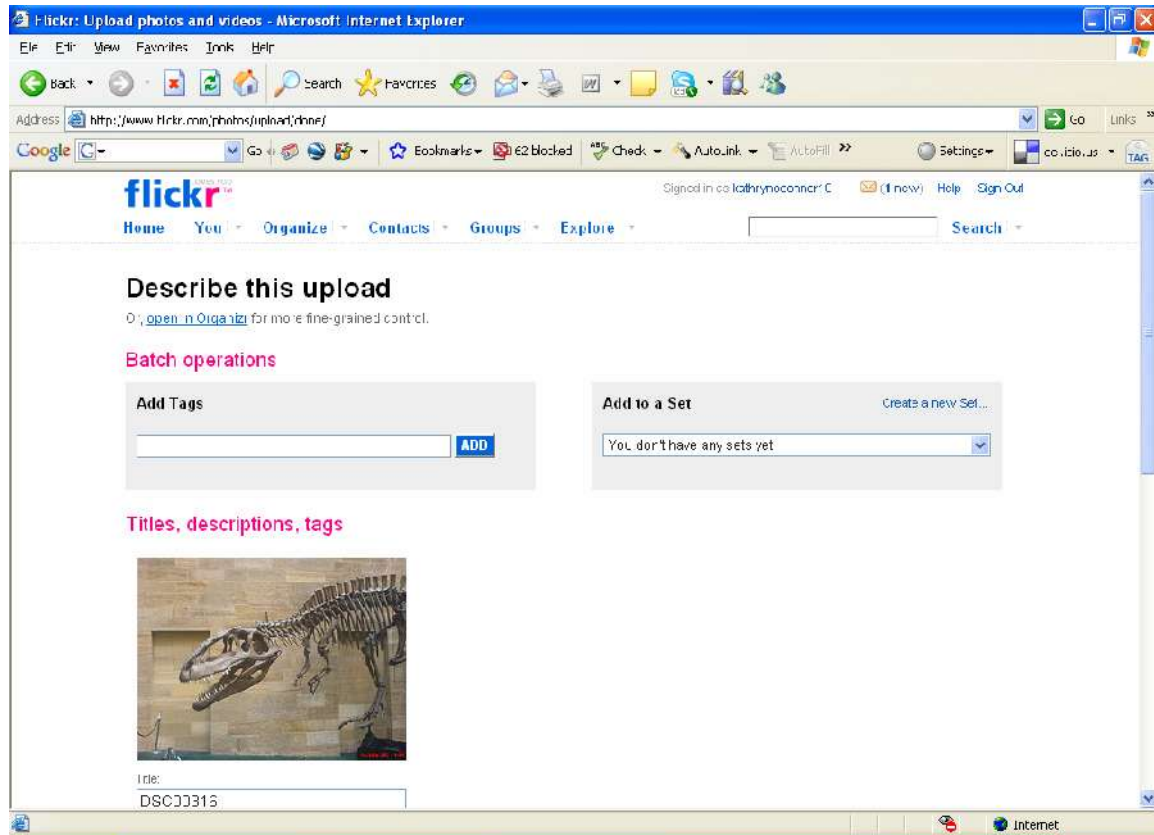
You will now be presented with a page which displays 5 'browse' function areas. There is a limit of 5MB on each photo. It is important to TAG your 'batch' of photos. Often you will want to upload pictures from one event or setting at a time and therefore the Tag should relate to this event or venue such as 'Glasgow Piping'. There may be some primary key words or tags you use to specify the event or batch ie;

“Glasgow piping” crowd Sunday

This set of tags is specific to the Glasgow piping batch as these two words at in speech marks “ “and then the other two words to follow are specific to the batch

Now set the privacy setting and if these are for public view then select the button 'public' and Save.

Now the picture appears in a new page and flickr will ask you if you want to provide more information on the picture by 'describing the upload'



Here you ideally be leaving a descriptive title of the picture and a brief description and most importantly TAG. Separate distinct tags by a space and these will be collated appropriately. Once you are happy with this image select 'Save this batch'

You will now see a copy of the photo and relevant information such as the date of upload and its public status and title. There will also be green writing which says you have '0 comments', click on this writing to add a comment. Comments are used to be descriptive about the image and explain the situation and moment being captured.
